### MESSAGE FROM MISS KENNEDY

Over the last couple of years, we have experienced many changes. This year will certainly go down in History! I have learnt how resilient we are, how adaptable we can be and how we are able to move forward with true grit and determination in everything we do. Lately, we have been reflecting on the vision statement. We asked ourselves, 'Does it reflect who we are now?' The an-

swer was that it did not. In the few years I have worked at Grampound Road, I have recognised that 'love' has been at the heart of everything we do. 'Love' had to be in the new vision statement. During the peak of the virus, NHS and care workers gave their lives to help others; 'love' is at the centre of what they do. In lockdown, the schools stayed open, staff worked through it all, not knowing how bad things were going to be. They did this out of love. When called upon, people stepped up. As a staff, we spent hours discussing the words that we wanted in our vision statement. Every word had to matter. It had to sum up what we believe in. Eventually we agreed:

### 'Together with love, we can inspire, discover and thrive.'


Our new vision statement includes everyone working together for one aim, to love and thrive. We want children to be inspired, not only by their teachers, but also by each other. We had to include the word discover. Shouldn't education be based on discovery and wonder? We all need to feel love and be loved in order to thrive.

Next, we debated the 100 words. We wanted our values to be included as the values are the bedrock of our Christian foundations. We felt that this describes our friendly school:

At Grampound Road School, we enable all children and adults to be 'Rooted and Grounded in Love' so that they grow to the fullness of their potential, living lives with respect, compassion, trust, wisdom, perseverance and forgiveness. Our values are embedded in all aspects of school life and we encourage all members of our community to promote an ethos where care and respect is shown to everyone. We are inclusive, welcoming and nurturing to all. Children are at the heart of everything we do. Our happy school provides a stimulating environment where children are inspired to learn, discover and thrive.

Finally, we choose a linked Bible story, **'The Good Samaritan**.' Captain Tom Moore was an inspiration here. He is a Good Samaritan who inspired other Good Samaritans. Our staff at Grampound Road are Good Samaritans. They are the most devoted and caring group of people I have ever worked with. Your children are awesome and they make it easy for us to love our jobs. In September when all our children come back to school, we will take the time to launch and fully embed our new vision statement and the Bible story. It will be something that is lived, not just a display or a tag line on a letterhead.

I hope you like the new vision statement and I hope you feel the value of every word. Your children have inspired us to write this.






# **Class News**






